NEAR DEATH EXPERIENCE

December 2010

I was in Honduras on a mission project this past Spring and some of us were taking food by mule back into the remote villages in the mountains. I was informed the trip would only take an hour but that it would be very strenuous. I knew Gilda and I could handle that much exercise so we decided to go along with the others. To make a long story short it took over 5 hours and the terrain was very difficult. The group included 5 men, 3 women and a young boy to lead the mule loaded with 300 pounds of food. On the return trip one of the ladies and I got ill from low blood sugar (diagnosed later) and possible heat exhaustion. Since it was supposed to be a short trip, we had not taken food with us. Heat, strenuous exercise and no groceries do not make for a good combination for someone with diabetes. One of my best friends, who considers himself an expert outdoors man and hiker, told me I was suffering from heat exhaustion and needed salt. He proceeded to feed me a bunch of peanuts. That was not a good move. As we proceeded, I realized I was not going to make it because I was feeling so weak and nauseous. I informed my sweet wife that this was it, and I was going home to be with the Lord so be prepared for my death. One team member went ahead to the village to get the nurses while I proceeded to throw up everything that I had eaten. Gilda held my head and comforted me as best she could. In the midst of my vomiting a hungry skinny puppy ran out of the woods and began gobbling up everything that I was ejecting. He was a very happy little dog to have something to eat that had already been chewed and was proper puppy food. Gilda discovered some M&Ms and gave them to me. Then the nurses arrived and gave me some food with sugar and took my blood pressure. In a few minutes I was back to normal and was able to finish the day on a glorious high, being thankful that I had cheated death once again.

Here are some lessons I learned from the experience: never believe a Honduran when he gives you a time schedule, never go on long mountain hikes without food and do not expect your friends to give you much sympathy. For the rest of the trip I was made fun of almost every night with a demonstration of how I was throwing up while my poor wife tried to comfort me. I guess it was funny after it was over, but I am still having trouble seeing the humor of it all.
